

Substance use and Intergenerational Trauma Social Processes (SITS) Research Team

The Substance use and Intergenerational Trauma Social processes (SITS) research team explores the interpersonal (e.g., family socialization, cultural socialization, postmemory/countermemory, intersectional microaggressions, social support, meaning-making, subjective appraisal, community connectedness) and institutional/systemic (e.g., colonization, cultural dispossession, collective cultural memory, institutional oppression) social processes underlying substance use and intergenerational trauma among marginalized populations (e.g., BIPOC folks, LGBTQ+ BIPOC folks).

We take a liberation psychology, critical psychology, and postcolonial studies-informed approach, grounding our explorations with the assumption that knowledge production is not neutral, but rather always situated in power relations. We predominately use critical qualitative research methodologies (e.g., interpretative phenomenological analysis, constructivist grounded theory, reflexive thematic analysis, ethnography, critical discourse analysis, community based participatory action research, photovoice, countermemory, and the archive).

Our goals are to (re-)conceptualize substance use and intergenerational trauma in relation to the historical conditions that inform them for marginalized communities to better inform communal healing. We aim to do community-informed work and will partner with local organizations in the Bay Area to prioritize the elevation of community voices rather than doing research that remains in the ivory tower.

Research Areas

Intergenerational trauma; historical trauma; cultural dispossession from colonialism; family socialization; cultural socialization; substance use (cultural stress/coping paradigm); harm reduction

Current Research Projects

An interpretative phenomenology study of how individuals who descend from peoples who have experienced colonization, enslavement, or genocide understand, experience, and express their identities (especially gender and sexuality)

A critical discourse analysis study of how CA domestic violence shelters construct their policies concerning substance use among their residents (collaboration with Dr. Amanda Fanniff's DIPP lab)

An interpretative phenomenological analysis of how those from non Abrahamic religious groups negotiate their LGBTQ+ identities (collaboration with Dr. Tyler Lefevor from Utah State University)

Research Mentorship/Team Culture

Co-construction/collectivism over toxic hyper-individualism – the team is a space of collaboration and no one person's voice is more important than anyone else's.

Meeting people where they are – it is ok to not know things! Asking questions, intellectual and cultural humility, and being in a stage of growing is not only encouraged, but also celebrated.
